# Understanding & Supporting First Gen Students

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### Defining First Gen Students

- Students whose parents did not complete a postsecondary education
- It doesn't always mean "first in the family to go to college"
- Definition can vary by source
  - U.S. Department of Education: student whose parents did not complete a 4year degree
  - ISAC: student whose parents did not obtain a postsecondary degree

### First Gen Student Population

#### Across the states:

- 1 in 3 undergraduate students are first generation (about 5 million students)
  - 31% are under the age of 23
  - 57% are over the age of 24

#### • In Illinois:

- 184,000 first generation students enrolled in college
- 4 out of 10 are enrolled in a community college



## Racial Differences Among First Gen Students

- Parents Without a Postsecondary Degree
  - 29% of White students
  - 21% of Black students
  - 15% of Hispanic students
- At least One Parent with a Postsecondary Degree
  - 72% of White students
  - 57% of Black students
  - 58% of Hispanic students

## The educational gains associated with having a college-educated parent are widespread

## Challenges Facing First Generation Students

### Barriers to a Postsecondary Education

- First generation students experience numerous challenges
- Some of these may be unique to first gen students, others may be similar to those of other student populations
  - Parental support
  - Navigating the higher education process
  - Paying for college
  - Mental health
  - Sense of belonging
  - Other responsibilities

### Parental Support

- Parents may try to support students but are unfamiliar with the college-going process
- College may not be seen as a priority
- Financial implications may prevent parents from providing support
- Cultural barriers also arise (e.g., students leaving home)

#### Navigating the Higher Ed Process

Lack of access to information about the college-going process

Less likely to enroll selective colleges – 31% apply to institutions with open/rolling admissions

Unaware of the different support options available at colleges and universities designed for first gen students

## Paying For College

- The cost of college is one of the primary barriers and concerns for first gen students
- Students are often unaware of financial aid available
- Parents may be reluctant (for various reasons) to share the information necessary to complete financial aid applications (e.g., tax documents, income information, etc.)
- More likely to accrue debt for their education

## What type of financial aid are first gen students receiving?

#### **Public Universities**

- First gen: \$5,100 in needbased aid
- Non first gen: \$3,200 in need-based aid

#### **Private Universities**

- First gen: \$8,900 in need-based aid
- Non first gen: \$8,800 in need-based aid

#### Mental Health

## First gen student experience many emotions before, during, and after their postsecondary experience

- Breakaway guilt Feeling of guilt for separating from their family
  - Leaving family/loved ones "behind"
  - Having access to other opportunities
  - Not pulling their weight within the family (translating, driving, caretaker)
- Homesickness potentially the first time away from home/family for an extended period of time
- Depression and/or Anxiety Affect their daily functioning
  - Students in a new environment and may not have a support system
  - Can lead to social isolation
  - Impact grades → eligibility for aid

### Sense of Belonging

- May experience imposter syndrome
  - Feeling like they don't belong
  - Question/second-guess their abilities
  - Also leads to depression and anxiety
- First gen students may not know:
  - Anyone else on campus
  - How to build a community or network on campus
  - That resources and support services exist (or how to access them)

### Other Responsibilities

Familial

Hesitant to enroll or "go away" for school because they are the support system for younger siblings and/or parents

Financial

May work to help with individual and family finances

Academic

Balancing school commitments (internship, volunteer, etc.)

#### **Additional Barriers**

## Housing and/or food insecure

 Students who are experiencing homelessness or were in DCFS care, are more likely to experience these than their peers

#### **Medical care**

- Students may be unaware of if their university offers health insurance
- For students who are new to the area, are unaware of what health care systems they have access to

## Child and dependent care

 Students may not have adequate childcare – this may lead to missing class or withdrawal from class because they do not have support to attend school

#### First Gen Stories

## Supporting First Gen Students Through Best Practices & Resources

#### **Best Practices**

Break away from stereotypes (overachiever, resilient narrative) When connecting students with resources/programs on and off campus, build partnerships with these organizations

Identify which institutional scholarships are specifically for first generation students

### How High Schools Are Helping

- First Gen student clubs geared towards helping first gen students succeed to and through the college-going process
- Parent programming including parents in the conversation is essential and parent-specific programming can help parents understand the process of applying and going to college
- Targeted supports supporting students who may not be thinking about going to college

#### How Universities Are Helping

- Here in Illinois, several schools across the state are designated as First Gen Forward Schools
- They are dedicated to making first gen students build a community, have supports as they transition and persist through school and more
- Some institutions have organizations for first generation students

#### **TRIO Programs**

- TRIO Programs are available at 2-year and 4-year institutions
- TRIO Programs are open to first generation students, low-income, individuals with disabilities, and students from disadvantaged backgrounds
- The Upward Bound and Talent Search programs provide:
  - Support high school students through the college-going process
  - Support their transition from high school into postsecondary work

- with college application workshops, provide one-on-one mentoring, and conduct a variety of other related services.

## Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

- Provides support for low-income people and families to purchase food
- Two main considerations:
  - Income and expenses
  - The number of people who live in the household
- Illinois has additional requirements for individuals and families
- Students enrolled at least half-time in 2-year and 4-year institutions are eligible!


### **SNAP Eligibility Requirements**

- Be enrolled at least half-time at an institution of higher education
- Meet at least one exemption
  - Work at least 20 hours a week in paid employment
  - Participate in a state of federally financed work-study program
  - Participate in an on-the-job training program
  - Care for a child under the age of six
  - Are a single parent enrolled full-time in college and taking care of a child under 12
  - A program under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act
- Meet all other SNAP eligibility requirements
- Students living on campus are not eligible for SNAP because their meals can be covered through a mandatory or optional meal plan
